Dear Sir,

In reply to your circular letter of the 28th ultimo (No. 14/4179/137) on the subject of the absentee provisions of the Land & Income Tax as applied to members of the Expeditionary Forces, I have to inform you that by the law of this State a taxpayer is not deemed to be an absentee if he has been in Australia during any portion of the year on the basis of which the tax is imposed.

Hence, for the year 1914/15 Assessment of Land & Income Tax, no ratepayer will be deemed an absentee who was a resident of any part of the Commonwealth of Australia for at least one day in 1914.

The Commissioner will therefore, in the next assessment, not treat any person who leaves or has left Australia in 1914 as an absentee, and such person would require to be absent during the whole of 1915 to be regarded as an absentee in the succeeding 1915/16 assessment. Further, (and this is important) no person is deemed an absentee for taxation purposes if he is absent from the Commonwealth "on the Public Service"

To THE HOW THE PREMIER

PERTH

I have to report as follows in this matter:-

By the law of this State a taxpayer is not deemed to be an absentee if he has been in Australia during any portion of the year on the basis of which the tax is imposed.

Hence, for the next 1914-15 assessment of Land and Income Tax no taxpayer will be deemed an absentee who was a resident of any part of the Commonwealth of Australia for at least one day in the year 1914.

I shall therefore in next assessment not treat any person who leaves or has left Australia in 1914 as an absentee, and he would require to be absent during the whole of 1915 to be regarded as an absentee in the succeeding 1915-16 assessment.

Eurther, (and this is important) no person is deemed an absentee for taxation purposes if he is absent from the Commonwealth "on the public service." I regard absence as a member of the Australian Expeditionary Force as eminently absence on the public service of the Crown and Nation.

The position is therefore that no member of the Australian Expeditionary Forces will be treated as an absence under the Taxation laws of Western Australia when his absence from the Commonwealth is due to his connection with such forces.

I have the honour to inform you that it has been decided that members of the Australian Expeditionary Forces will not be liable to pay Commonwealth Land Tax under the absentee provisions.

Should there be any law of your State, under which, unless otherwise directed, any member of the Expeditionary Forces, as a result of absence due to his connection with such forces, would be deemed for any purpose to be an absentee and liable to penalties. I think it would be a graceful act on the part of your Government and one that would be highly appreciated by the members of the Forces, as well as the public generally, if you could see your way to make exceptions in the cases of members of the Expeditionary Forces.



I am forwarding the attached request for the release of three prisoners of war at Rottnest for your careful consideration.

When up on the Fields a few days ago Mr. George Stella, President of the Croation Slavopic Society waited upon me and laid his case before me. As Slavs these people are opposed to the Austrian rule, and this is why they are in Western Australia. Fost of them are members of the Croation String Band. They claim, and I believe rightly so, that they are loyal citizens of the Pritish Empire, they have contributed to the Coldfields Patriotic Fund, and take a prominent part in Patriotic Concerts. Their performances, especially the rendering of our National airs, such as "Rule Brittania", "God Save the King", etc., being most masterly and entertaining. I am quite satisfied, after conversation with them, that if necessary they would take up arms to protect Australia against Austrian rule. The present war is hailed with delight by them, as they believe it affords a good opportunity of their State becoming detached from Austro-Hungarian rule, to which they have been subjected as slaves, as they put it, for 800 years. They are prepared to give a guarantee for the good behaviour of the members.



with further reference to your communication of the 17th. September, and your reminder of the 16th. October, with regard to having the small cable house at Rottnest repaired. I beg to inform you that the Secretary of the Harbour Trust now advises that the Trust had already received word, and steps have been taken to put the shed in proper order.

In his communication the Secretary of the Trust points out that there is not much ground for apprehension of a serious position, even if the cables were out, as the Harbour Trust system is such that complete communication could be maintained by heliograph by day and powerful Morse Code Signal lamps at night (which have been installed for some years) and in addition an interruption of the cable would immediately call for an investigation from Premantle. He adds that it might not be generally known that telephonic communication with the Island has been cut off on many occasions, but their system of signals is so complete, and the men are such splendid Morse Code Signalmen that no interruption of business has occurred although the cable has been out of use for days at a time.

Dear Sir.

In regard to your letter of 17th inst. in reference to the report that the hut at Bickley Bay, Rottnest Island, which receives the land end of the telephone cable to the mainland was being damaged by white ants, I have to inform you that we had already had word of this and steps were being taken to effect repairs, the damage not being at all extensive.

As regards the apparent fear that someone might cut the cable and so create a serious position, I do not think there is much ground for apprehension as even if the cable were cut the Harbour Trust system is such that complete communication would be maintained with the Island by heliograph by day and powerful which we have had installed by some way.


Morse Code Signal lamps at night, and in addition an interruption to the cable immediately calls for an investigation from Fremantle.

It may not be known perhaps but the telephonic communication with the Island has been cut off on many occasions but our system of signals is so complete and the men are such expert Morse Code Signalmen that no interruption has occurred though we have not had the use of the cable for days at a time.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, the Senate, and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Trading with the Enemy Act short title 5 1914.

2.—(1.) In this Act, unless the contrary intention appears—

"The Comptroller-General" means the Comptroller-General of Customs:

"The present state of war" means the period from the fourth
day of August One thousand nine hundred and fourteen,
at the hour of eleven o'clock post meridiem reckoned
according to Greenwich standard time, until the issue of
a proclamation by the Governor-General that the war
between His Majesty the King and the German Emperor
and between his Majesty the King and the Emperor
of Austria King of Hungary has ceased.

(2.) For the purposes of this Act a person shall be deemed to trade with the Enemy if he performs or takes part in—

20 (a) any act or transaction which is prohibited by or under any proclamation issued by the King and published in the Gazette, whether before or after the commencement of this Act, and

(b) any act or transaction which at common law or by statute constitutes trading with the enemy.

- 3. -(1.) Any person who, during the continuance of the present state of war, trades or has before the commencement of this Act traded with the enemy shall be guilty of an offence.
- (2.) An offence against this section may be prosecuted either summarily or upon indictment, but an offender shall not be liable to 5 be punished more than once in respect of the same offence.
- (3.) The punishment for an offence against this section shall be as follows :-
 - (a) If the offence is prosecuted summarily-a fine not exceeding Five hundred pounds, or imprisonment for 10 any term not exceeding twelve months, or both ;
 - (b) If the offence is prosecuted upon indictment-a fine of any amount, or imprisonment for not more than seven years, or both.
- (4.) Any goods or money in relation to which an offence against 15 this section has been committed or which has been used in connexion with such an offence shall be forfeited to the King, and may be seized by any officer of police or person thereto authorized in writing by the Comptroller-General.
- (5.) A corporation guilty of an offence against this section shall 20 be liable to the pecuniary penalties thereby provided, and any director, officer, servant, or agent of a corporation who is knowingly concerned in the commission of an offence against this section by the corporation shall be deemed to be guilty of the offence and punishable accordingly by fine or imprisonment or both.
- (6.) A prosecution for an offence against this section shall not be instituted without the written consent of the Attorney-General.

- 4. (1.) Where it appears to a Justice of the Peace that an offence has been, or is likely to be, committed by any person, firm, or company against the last preceding section, he may, upon 30 information on oath made by the Comptroller-General or a person thereto authorized by him, by warrant authorize any person named
 - (a) to inspect any books or documents belonging to or in the possession or control of the person, firm, or company; 35
 - (b) to require any person whom the Comptroller-General believes to be able to give information or produce books or documents respecting the business or trade of the person, firm, or company to give such 40 information or produce such books or documents;
 - (c) if accompanied by an officer of police or prescribed officer, to search any premises used or believed by the Comptroller-General to be used in connexion with 45 such business or trade.

- 40 the Minister may apply to the High Court for the appointment of a controller of the firm or company, and the High Court shall have power to appoint such a controller for such time and with such powers and subject to such conditions as the Court thinks fit, and the powers so conferred shall be those of a receiver and 45 manager under the laws relating to bankruptcy or insolveney in

force in the State in which the firm or company carries on business, with such modifications, restrictions, and extensions as the Court thinks fit, including (if the Court considers it necessary or expedient for the purpose of enabling the controller to borrow money) the power, upon special application made to the Court for that purpose, to create charges on the property of the firm or company in priority to existing charges.







AUSTRALIA'S NAVY FOR BRITAIN.

"NORTH SEA NOT TO BE GERMAN OCEAN."

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

MELEOURNE, Aug. 11. A private conference of Federal Ministers and State Premiers opened here to-day. It agreed to schemes providing for the free transit of ExpeditionaryForces over the State railways to ports of embarkation, and also the utilisation of the entire financial re-sources of all the Governments to keep industries going throughout the war.

To-morrow the conference will consider the question of uniform legislation for penalising exploiters of food supplies, and for granting the State Governmente reserve powers for the temporary nationalisation of

supplies in emergency.

The Labour leaders, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Hughes, are co-operating with the Federal Ministers daily.

The patriotic fund already exceeds £100,000.

A Renter message adds that the Common wealth Navy was yesterday transferred to the British Navy until the conclusion of the

The members of a German street band who became naturalised immediately before war was declared state that they are prepared to fight for the British.

Speaking at the Lord Mayor's quarterly luroheon, Sir Lyulph Stanley, the Governor of Victoria, described the present conflict as a war in which liberty was fighting against aggression. "The North Sca," he said, will remain the North Sea. It will not be called the German Ocean."

Mr. Cook, the Commonwealth Premier, said: "Australia has the men and the money, too. We must see it through. We have slept, eaten, and grown rich while the great fleets of the Empire protected us. Now these fleets are called away it is up to us not only to protect Australia, but to rally to the help of the Empire."

MORE LOYAL OFFERS.

MORE LOYAL OFFERS.

Offers of help from other parts of the Empire continue to be received. From Tasmania applications to join the Australian Expeditionary Force are pouring in, says Reuter, and at Auckland, New Zealand, a large meeting authorited £1,000 to the Patriotic Fund, the Racing Club adding a similar amount. A Bombay message reports that offers of support from the native States continue to pour in, and enthusiastic loyal meetings are being held in every town in India.

To allay rumours among the South African natives, says a Reuter message from Cape Town, the Government has issued a message explaining the facts of the war. It tells the natives that there is little probability of any trouble which would seriously affect them, though there may be disturbance of commercial conditions which may curtail opportunities for employment. The Government hopes the natives will continue their customary loyalty, and promises that General Botha is ready to keep them informed of events.





THE PUBLIC SERVICE.

The following is quoted from the latest sense of the "Civil Service Journal".—"Immediately it became known that the Empire was at war, the sir became thick with runiours of retreachment. We were told that salaries would be reduced and that dismisshs would be numerous. In the last same of the Journal, however, we were able to publish the information that at an interview with the Premier, the president of the association (Mr. J. J. O'Neill) had received an assurance that the Government had no intention of puting on the service any special burden, and that all we should be asked to do was to bear our fair share. The Government has loyally abided by that undertaking, and the service, on its part, has willingly accepted its responsibilities. Self-constituted financiars, in Parliment and outside, have pointed out what they urge as an obvious means of reducing the national expenditure by cutting down the civil service. Indeed, some of those kerbstone critics' have declaimed wildly against the Government for not incontinently sacking half the service. If those blatant elarmists are too danse to be aware of the fatuousness of their demand for a reduced service at the very time when most Government offices are, by reason of the necessities created by the war, working full time and at high pressure, it would be idle to endeavour to enlighten them and still more ille to ask them to be just to the service. The Premier, very equitally, took the stand that it was not a fair proposition to ask any body of workers whose services were unitsed full time to accept a reductionate any rate, not until the erigencies of the State's financial position justified such a course; and that time is certainly not yet. That is emplaitedly a propor course. It has to be remembered—but, of course income prevail. Again, a fairly large number of civil servants have joined the colours since the war commenced—some as volunteers in the expeditionary force, and others under the condition of compulsory service. HON. THE PREMIER.

Civil Servants who went to the Boer war were granted leave of absence without pay and their positions were kept open for them and they were reinstated on their return.

Our experience on that occasion disclosed three necessities:-

- That no man is to be at liberty to claim consideration under any arrangements made unless he, before absenting himself from his duties, received written authority from the Government entitling him to such consideration on his return.
- 2. That the right to such consideration will lapse unless he returns to the State when the Contingent as a whole returns,
- 3. That the consideration be definitely defined and officially announced.

As there is no necessity at this juncture for married men to enlist I think only Civil Servants who are single men, free of responsibility for the maintenance of others, should have special consideration shown to them.

The special consideration I suggest should be as follows:-

- 1. To be granted leave of absence without pay.
- 2. In order to secure sick and long service leaves seniority for promotion, etc. etc., such leave to be counted as service, although the Public Service Act prohitits it. If necessary Parliament might be asked to authorize.







Austrians and Italians on the Kalgoorlie Mines, 491, employed by the Firewood Companies, 559, on the outside mines, such as Sons of Gwalia, Ida H., Sandstone, Youanme, Great Fingal, and Meckatharra Mines, estimated number 600.

The Kalgoorlie miners, (Foreign), have been most carefully examined, and of these, about one half are Austrians. These latter do not all come under Military requirements. After careful examination some 50 have been forwarded to Rottnest.

The principle of arrest is as follows :-

All men under the age of 32 years, and who have been less than four years in the State, and who are Reservists, are subject to detention.

All married men, having wives and while was dependents in the State are not to be interfered with. It is thought undesirable at present to interfere with Foreigners in regular work, away from the principal centres.



"August 26th. It is the policy of H.M.Government to restore as far as possible trade to its normal footing. Except therefore as regards pack saddles and draught animals suitable for use in war no restriction should be put on trade with the other parts of the British Empire our Allies and Meutral. As regards pack-saddles and draught animals suitable for use in war their export except to other parts of the British Empire should be prohibited. On the other hand if there are any grounds for believing that supplies of any sort going to a neutral country are finding their way into the hands of the enemy or if there is any abnormal demand for any commodity for use in the manufacture of war-like stores the fact should be at once reported to H.M.Government. 



AGRICULTURAL BANK

ADVANCES.

To the Editor.

Sir,—Owing to the State Agricultural Bank having announced that they will only advance 50 per cent. of the value of the larmers certificates for work done, a great deal of inconvenience and hardship are being caused to farmers and the small contractors or labourers dependent on them. Indeed, comparatively few city people realise o what a large extent farmers and others in the country have been dependent on the bank in the past. Scrub-rolling, dam-sinking, fencing, etc., will be held upthus throwing a lot of men on the unemployed market as well as delaying the development of the country. The farmer will be unable to do this work himself, as scrub-rolling cannot be done profitably unless he can employ a tractor or the special gear owned by scrub-rolling contractors. Similarly, fencing cannot now be done unless the farmer can pay for at least half the material, leaving the bank to pay for the balance when the work is compisted. In order to a "a to the same country of the certificates for the value of the deferred payment (i.e., 50 per cent. of the work done) in some form that the farmer could use in obtaining credit from merchants or country storkeepers. Although he might not be able to negotiate the full value of thesis deferred payments, still even 50 per cent. of their value (making, with the amount advanced by the bank, 75 per cent. in all) would be a material help at the present time. The bank could issue a certificate for whatever proportion of the deferred payment was agreed upon between the merchant and the farmer, this to be honoured by the Lank when the financial position is again normal. As interest on this certificate for whatever proportion of its face for payment was agreed to the farmers' account by the bank from the date of issue it should bear a provision on its face for payment of interest to the holder up to the time the bank is in a position to redeem it.—Yours, etc.,

Dear Mr. Millington --

I am in receipt of your letter of the 21st inst., having regard to a communication received from Mrs. Rapley suggesting that a meeting of Labor women should be convened for the purpose of devising ways and means of assisting wives and families of reservists, and in reply thereto I would like to say that I could not accept the conditions that are laid down in your letter. As a matter of fact, so far as I am concerned, the object of asking the wives of Ministers and Members to meet us is to discuss the whole position that has arisen due to the war crisis, more particularly as it affects women and children who are wives and children of reservists or those who have volunteered, or others who may be affected by lack of employment, etc., not forgetting, above all, the need of some attention being given to what might be termed homeless girls, who are employed in our shops and factories, who might be left without employment and consequently homeless.

The question of what duties the Committee should undertake would be a matter for decision at the meeting, but what has prompted Mrs. Rapley and Ministers and Members wives and others is the need that Labor women, as well as others, should take some interest in these matters, largely from the point of view of advising where stress exists and the best means of relieving it.

The Executive is evidently under the impression that the reservists are receiving different pay and treatment from those who volunteered as members of the Expeditionary Force and those called out for local defence. So far as pay and conditions are concerned, these men are encamped, rations are found and 5/- per day by way of allowance, so that they are on all fours with our own men. Again, the Executive assert that the reservists are due for special consideration because they were compelled to join the ranks, whereas those forming the Expeditionary Force can please themselves. Even were this correct, it is showing a poor spirit at a time when we are in the midst of such a crisis. It must not be forgotten that although the reservists are now compelled to join the ranks, this obligation only devolves upon them because earlier in their career they volunteered for service and joined the ranks in times of peace, thus voluntarily making themselves liable to be called upon in time of war. Our own men have volunteered out of a desire to assist the Empire in the time of her need, so that, even from this point of view, I consider that our own men have shown a spirit equally as good, if not better than the reservists, and they and their dependents are equally entitled to our consideration. I do not suggest that we should at this stage take any part in the raising of funds, but merely to endeavour to get Labor women in the different centres to keep in touch with all cases of distress amongst women and children for the purpose of having assistance rendered by the proper authorities.



PROCLAMATION

Commonwealth of Australia to wit.

R. M. FERGUSON, Governor-General. By His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir Ronald Craufurd Munro Ferguson, a Member of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Prize Courts Act* 1894 it is enacted that when any commission, warrant, or instructions from His Majesty the King or the Admiralty for the purpose of commissioning or regulating the procedure of a prize court at any place in a British possession have been issued, then, subject to instructions from His Majesty, the Vice-Admiral of such possession may, when satisfied by information from a Secretary of State or otherwise that war has broken out between His Majesty and any foreign State, proclaim that war has so broken out, and that thereupon the said commission warrant and instructions shall take effect as if the same had been issued after the breaking out of such war and such foreign State were named therein:

And whereas on the tenth day of July in the sixty-third year of Her reign Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was pleased to issue a commission to certain Commissioners therein named, authorizing and enjoining the said Commissioners to will and require such Courts (including among other Courts of Law being Colonial Courts of Admiralty within the meaning of the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act 1890) as the said Commissioners should select, upon proclamation being made in that part of Her Majesty's Dominions Possessions or Colonies within which such Court has jurisdiction in Admiralty by the Vice-Admiral thereof, that war has broken out between Her Majesty and some foreign State or States, and not otherwise, to take cognizance of and judicially to proceed upon all and all manner of captures, recaptures, seizures, prizes, reprisals of all ships, vessels, and goods then already seized and taken, and which thereafter shall be seized and taken, and all other matters of prize falling within the jurisdiction of Prize Courts, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the course of Admiralty, and the Law of Nations, and the Statutes, Rules, and Regulations in that behalf for the time being in force, to adjudge and condemn all such ships, vessels, and goods as shall belong to the State or States named in the Proclamation aforesaid, or to the subjects of such State or States, or to any other person inhabiting within any of the Countries, Territories, or Dominions of such State or States or be otherwise condemnable as Prize.

And whereas by divers warrants the said Commissioners did will and require the Supreme Court of each of the States of the Commonwealth, in its Admiralty jurisdiction, upon proclamation being made by the Vice-Admiral for the time being of that State that war has broken out between His Majesty and any foreign State, and not otherwise, to take cognizance of and judicially to proceed upon all and all manner of captures, recaptures, seizures, prizes, and reprisals of all ships, vessels, and goods which shall on the outbreak of any such war have been already seized and taken, and which shall thereafter be seized and taken, and which are or shall be brought within the limits of the said court, and all other matters of prize falling within the jurisdiction of the said court, and to hear and determine the same according to the

course of Admiralty and the Law of Nations, and the Statutes Rules and Regulations in that behalf for the time being in force, to adjudge and condemn all such ships, vessels and goods as shall belong to the foreign States named in such proclamation or to the subjects of such State, or to any others inhabiting within any of the Countries, Territories, or Dominions of the same, or which are otherwise condemnable as Prize, and which shall be brought before the said Supreme Court for adjudication and condemnation:

AND WHEREAS by the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act 1890 it is enacted that whenever there is not a formally appointed Vice-Admiral in a British possession, or any place therein, the Governor of the possession shall be ex officio Vice-Admiral thereof:

AND WHEREAS, there not being a formally appointed Vice-Admiral in any of the States of the Commonwealth, the Governors of the respective States, in their respective capacities as Vice-Admirals, have proclaimed, or are about to proclaim, that war has broken out between His Majesty the King and the German Emperor and the Emperor of Austria, King of Hungary:

And whereas it is desirable, for further assurance, that I should make this proclamation:

Now therefore I, Sir Ronald Craufurd Munro Ferguson, the Governor-General aforesaid, being satisfied thereof by information received by me, do hereby proclaim that war has broken out between His Majesty the King and the German Emperor, and also between His Majesty the King and the Emperor of Austria, King of Hungary.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Commonwealth of Australia, at Melbourne, this nineteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and in the fifth year of His Majesty's Reign.

MILITARY FORCES OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

AUTHORITY TO ENTER UPON AND USE LANDS FOR TRAIN-ING IN THE VICINITY OF BROADMEADOWS, VICTORIA, BETWEEN THE 14TH AUGUST AND THE 31ST DECEMBER.

H IS Excellency the Governor-General, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, has been pleased to approve, under the powers conferred by section 69 of the Defence Act 1903-1912, of the Commonwealth Military Forces, being authorized to enter upon and use for training, manœuvres, or other Military purposes, between the 14th August and the 31st December, 1914, all those lands in the State of Victoria contained within the boundaries of the parishes of Greensborough and Nillumbik, in the county of Evelyn; the parishes of Fan Yean, Morang, in the counties of Evelyn and Bourke; and the parishes of Bolinda, Mickleham, Darraweit Guim, Havelock, Merriang, Bulleen, Boroondara, Cut-paw-paw, Truganina, Derrimut, Maribyrnong, Kororoit, Holden, Kall Kallo, Wollert, Yuroke, Tullamarine, Bulla Bulla, Will-will rook, Keelbundoora, Doutta Galla, Jika Jika, Melbourne North, and Melbourne South, in the county of Bourke; and that the owners or occupiers of any such land who claim that they have sustained any damage or loss by reason of such entry or use be required to submit their claims for such damage or loss to the District Commandant, Victoria, within seventy-two hours of such entry or use. Such claims will be submitted to a Board of three officers, and compensation as approved by the Minister of Defence may be paid to the said owners or occupiers.

poses, between the 17th August and the 10th October, 1914, all those lands in the State of Queensland, enclosed within the boundaries of the parishes of Enoggera, Kedron, Bunya, and Nundah, and that the owners or occupiers of any such land who claim that they have cocupiers of any such land who claim that they have sustained any damage or loss by reason of such entry or use be required to submit their claims for such damage or loss to the District Commandant, Queensland, within seventy-two hours of such entry or use. Such claims will be submitted to a Board of three officers, and compensation, as approved by the Minister of Defence, may be paid to the said owners or occupiers.

T is hereby notified for public information that, war having broken out between His Majesty the King and The Emperor of Austria, King of Hungary, His Majesty has been pleased to issue a proclamation applying to Austria-Hungary all proclamations made by His Majesty with reference to Germany upon the outbreak of war with Germany.

PROCLAMATION

Commonwealth of Australia to wit.

R. M. FERGUSON, Governor-General. By His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir Ronald Craufurd Munro Ferguson, a Member of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Commonwealth of Australia.

HEREAS His Majesty has been mindful, now that a state of war exists between this country and AUSTRIA-HUNGARY, of the recognition accorded to the practice of granting "days of grace" to enemy merchant ships by the Convention relative to the Status of Enemy Merchant Ships at the Outbreak of Hostilities, signed at The Hague on the 18th October, 1907: AND WHEREAS it is desirable to lessen, so far as may be practicable, the injury caused by war to peaceful and unsuspecting commerce: Now THEREFORE I, Sir Ronald Craufurd Munro Ferguson, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby order as follows:

- 1. From and after the publication of this Order no enemy merchant ship shall be allowed to depart, except in accordance with the provisions of this Order, from any port in the Commonwealth or a territory under the control of the Commonwealth.
- 2. In the event of one of the Ministers of State being satisfied by information reaching him not later than midnight on Saturday, the fifteenth day of August, 1914, that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which at the date of the outbreak of hostilities were in the ports of the enemy or which subsequently entered them is not less favorable than the treatment accorded to enemy merchant ships by Articles 3 to 7 of this Order, he shall notify the Prime Minister and the Minister of State for Defence accordingly, and public notice thereof shall forthwith be given in the Commonwealth Gazette, and Articles 3 to 8 of this Order shall thereupon come into full force and effect.

Commonwealth Gazette

- 3. Subject to the provisions of this Order, enemy merchant ships which-
 - (i.) At the date of the outbreak of hostilities were in any port in which this Order applies; or
 - (ii.) Cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and, after the outbreak of hostilities, enter a port to which this Order applies, with no knowledge of the war:

shall be allowed up till midnight on Saturday, the twenty-second day of August, 1914, for loading or unloading their cargoes, and for departing from such port:

Provided that such vessels shall not be allowed to ship any contraband of war, and any contraband of war already shipped on such vessels must be discharged.

4. Enemy merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and which with no knowledge of the war arrive at a port to which this Order applies after the expiry of the time allowed by Article 3 for loading or unloading cargo and for departing, and are permitted to enter, may be required to depart either immediately, or within such time as may be considered necessary by the Customs Officer of the port for the unloading of such cargo as they may be required or specially permitted to discharge.

Provided that such vessels may, as a condition of being allowed to discharge cargo, be required to proceed to any other specified British port, and shall there be allowed such time for discharge as the Customs Officer of that port may consider to be necessary.

Provided also that, if any cargo on board such vessel is contraband of war or is requisitioned under Article 5 of this Order, she may be required before departure to discharge such cargo within such time as the Customs Officer of the port may consider to be necessary; or she may be required to proceed, if necessary under escort, to any other of the ports specified in Article 1 of this Order, and shall there discharge the contraband under the like conditions.

- 5. His Majesty reserves the right recognised by the said Convention to requisition at any time subject to payment of compensation enemy cargo on board any vessel to which Articles 3 and 4 of this Order apply.
- 6. The privileges accorded by Articles 3 and 4 are not to extend to cable ships or to sea-going ships designed to carry oil fuel, or to ships whose tonnage exceeds 5,000 tons gross, or whose speed is 14 knots or over, regarding which the entries in Lloyd's Register shall be conclusive for the purposes of this Article. Such vessels will remain liable on adjudication by the Prize Court to detention during the period of the war, or to requisition, in accordance, in either case, with the Convention aforesaid. The said privileges will also not extend to merchant ships which show by their build that they are intended for conversion into war ships, as such vessels are outside the scope of the said Convention, and are liable on adjudication by the Prize Court to condemnation as prize.
- 7. Enemy merchant ships allowed to depart under Articles 3 and 4 will be provided with a pass indicating the port to which they are to proceed, and the route they are to follow.
- 8. A merchant ship which, after receipt of such a pass, does not follow the course indicated therein will be liable to capture.
- 9. If no information reaches one of the Ministers of State by the day and hour aforementioned to the effect that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which were in the ports of the enemy at the date of the outbreak of hostilities, or which subsequently entered them, is, in his opinion, not less favorable than that accorded to enemy merchant ships by Articles 3 to 8 of this Order, every enemy merchant ship which, on the outbreak of hostilities, was in any port to which this Order applies, and also every enemy merchant ship which cleared from its last port before the declaration of war, but which, with no knowledge of the war, enters a port to which this Order applies, shall, together with the cargo on board thereof, be liable to capture, and shall be brought before the Prize Court forthwith for adjudication.
- 10. In the event of information reaching one of the Ministers of State, that British merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, but are met with by the enemy at sea after the outbreak of hostilities, are allowed to continue their voyage without interference with either the ship or the cargo, or after capture are released with or without proceedings for adjudication in the Prize Court, or are to be detained during the war or requisitioned in lieu of condemnation as prize, he shall notify the Minister of State for Defence accordingly, and shall publish a notification thereof in the Commonwealth Gazette, and, in that event, but not otherwise, enemy merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and are captured after the outbreak of hostilities and brought before the Prize Courts for adjudication, shall be released or detained or requisitioned in such cases and upon such terms as may be directed in the said notification in the Commonwealth Gazette.
- 11. Neutral cargo, other than contraband of war, on board an enemy merchant ship which is not allowed to depart from a port to which this Order applies, shall be released.
- 12. In accordance with the provisions of Chapter III. of the Convention relative to certain Restrictions on the Exercise of the Right of Capture in Maritime War, signed at The Hague on the 18th October, 1907, an undertaking must, whether the merchant ship is allowed to depart or not, be given in writing by each of the officers and members of the crew of such vessel, who is of enemy nationality, that he will not, after the conclusion of the voyage for which the pass is issued, engage while hostilities last in any service connected with the operation of war. If any such officer is of neutral nationality, an undertaking must be given in writing that he will not serve, after the conclusion of the voyage for which the pass is issued, on any enemy ship while hostilities last. No undertaking is to be required from members of the crew who are of neutral nationality.

Officers or members of the crew declining to give the undertakings required by this Article will be detained as prisoners of war.
