

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ast The question to-day is whether there is any any truth in the rumour that Cabinet had decided upon a reduction in the salaries of Civil Servants to meet the emergencies arising out of the war conditions prevailing. The Premier said that there was absolutely no truth in the statement, concerning which a number of enquiries had already been received at the Premier's Office and Public Service Commissioner's Office. Personally, he did not consider that the penalising of any one section of the community was the best means of meeting a large problem of this kind, and favoured the idea of having a general wor tax if the necessity arose, which should be fairly and equitably distributed over the whole community according to the means and obligations of its several members. As a matter of fact, the only action that had been considered in this direction was a tax of this nature, but its imposition would be largely dependent upon whether the necessity arose for it, and upon what action was recommended by the Conference of Premiers now sitting in the Eastern States.

A BILL

FOR

AN ACT to regulate the Sale of the Necessaries of life during War.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Western Australia, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

- 5 1. This Act may be cited as The Control of Trade in War Time Act. Short title.
 - 2. In this Act the following terms have the meanings stated: Interpretation.
 - "Necessaries of life"—such products, goods, chattels, and things as the Governor may by proclamation declare to be necessaries of life for the purposes of this Act.
- "Personal Requirements."—The requirements of any person for not exceeding three months for the domestic use of himself, his family, dependents, and servants, and of his domestic animals.
- 3. This Act shall have operation only during such period as the Operation of Act.

 15 Governor may from time to time by proclamation declare, when a state of war exists between the United Kingdom and some other Power.

4.

Power to fix prices of necessaries. 4. The Governor, on the advice of a Royal Commission (which the Governor is hereby authorised to appoint) may, by Order in Council fix the maximum prices that may be lawfully charged for the necessaries of life.

Obligation to sell.

5. No person having in his possession or power any necessaries of life in excess of his personal requirements shall refuse to sell and deliver the same to any other person on demand, and on payment or tender of a price so fixed.

Penalty; £1,000; or imprisonment for not exceeding twelve months.

Power to seize.

6. On the conviction of any person under the last preceding section, it shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer and all persons acting with his authority to seize, take possession of, carry away, and dispose of any necessaries of life in the possession or power of the offender, and for such purpose to enter upon any premises in 15 which such necessaries of life may be or be supposed to be, and to use such force as may be necessary, subject only to the payment of maximum prices so fixed as aforesaid.

Corners and restrictions prohibited.

7. No person shall buy up or store the necessaries of life with intent to raise the prices thereof or to prevent free circulation 20 thereof; or, without the consent in writing of the Colonial Treasurer, export the necessaries of life to any place beyond the limits of the Commonwealth.

Penalty: £1,000; or imprisonment for 12 months.

Power to enter premises. 8. Any Police Officer acting with the authority of the 25 Commissioner, or an Inspector, or Sub-Inspector of the Police Force, and any other person acting with the authority of the Colonial Treasurer may enter and search any premises upon which such Police Officer or person believes that any necessaries of life are kept contrary to the provisions of this Act.

Aiders and abettors.

9. Whoever aids, abets, counsels, or procures, or by act or omission is in any way directly or indirectly concerned in the commission of any offence against this Act shall be deemed to have committed such offence and shall be punishable accordingly.

Proof.

10. In every prosecution under this Act an averment of the 35 prosecutor contained in the information or complaint shall be deemed to be proved in the absence of proof to the contrary.

Fiat of Attorney General. 11. No prosecution under this Act shall be commenced without the authority in writing of the Attorney General first obtained.

FOR

AN ACT to amend the Royal Commissioners' Powers Act. 1902.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Western Australia, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

- 1. This Act may be cited as the Royal Commissioners' Powers Act Short title. Amendment Act, 1914, and shall be read as one with the Royal Commissioners' Powers Act, 1902, hereafter referred to as the principal Act.
- 2. Section three of the principal Act is amended by omitting Amendment of 10 the word "one" before the words "hundred pounds," and inserting See Com. No. 4 of in place thereof "five."

3. Every witness who has been summoned to attend a Royal Duty of witness to Commission shall appear and report himself from day to day unless ance. excused by the Chairman of the Commission or until he is released Ibid, s. 7. 15 from further attendance by the Chairman of the Commission.

4. (1.) If any person served with a summons to attend a Royal Arrest of witness Commission as a witness fails to attend the Commission in answer failing to appear. to the summons, the Chairman may, on proof by statutory declaration of the service of the summons, issue a warrant for his 20 apprehension.

(2.)

- (2) The warrant shall authorise the apprehension of the witness and his being brought before the Commission, and his detention in custody for that purpose until he is released by order of the Chairman.
- (3.) The warrant may be executed by any member of the police 5 force, or by any person to whom it is addressed and the person executing it shall have power to break and enter any place, building, or vessel for the purpose of executing it.
- (4.) The apprehension of any witness under this section shall not relieve him from any liability incurred by him by reason of his 10 non-compliance with the summons.

Power of Commission in relation to documents produced. Ibid. s. 7.

5. A Royal Commission may inspect any documents, books, or writings produced before it, and may retain them for such reasonable period as it thinks fit, and may make copies of such matte as is relevant to the inquiry or take extracts from them.

Injury to witness. Ibid. s. 7.

6. Any person who uses, causes, inflicts, or procures any violence, punishment, damage, loss, or disadvantage to any person for or on account or his having appeared as a witness before any Royal Commission, or for or on account of any evidence given by him before any Royal Commission, shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: Five hundred pounds, or imprisonment for one year.

Dismissal by employers of witness. Ibid. s. 7.

7. (1.) Any employer who dismisses any employee from his employment, or prejudices any employee in his employment, for or on account of the employee having appeared as a witness before a Royal Commission, or for or on account of the employee having 25 given evidence before a Royal Commission, shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: Five hundred pounds, or imprisonment for one year.

(2.) In any proceeding for an offence against this section it 30 shall lie upon the employer to prove that any employee shown to have been dismissed or prejudiced in his employment was so dismissed or prejudiced for some reason other than the reasons mentioned in sub-section (1) of this section.



PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS.

Sydney, Aug. 5.

As soon as Parisament met to-day, the Premier made a statement on the situation. He said that he had received a communication that war had broken out between Great Britain and Germany. This information necessarily had cost new duries on the Government of the State, and probably new duties on the Parliament of the State. Unquestionably these matters would demand the closest attention of the Government, and members generally, in the course of the next few days. It would be apparent to all that difficulties of finance in connection with the industry and the ordinary life of the community would assuredly arise, and to these the first consideration of Parliament would have to be devoted. The Government had decided to sak Parliament to inset each day at 4.30 p.m., and adjourn immediately, unless in the interval some important matter had transpired. (Cheers.) He felt that it was impossible to ask members to proceed with the contentions programme that they intended to put through at this juncture. That programme would have to be suspended for the time being. Mr. Holman also announced that his colleagues had aiready considered certain matters in connection with the situation, and these would be turtler debated to-morrow when they proposed to have the presence and the advantage of the comment proposed to take in the direction of ensuring a greater measure of elasticity in the working of the industrial awards. The Premier further intimated that one of the subjects to be dealt with would be that dealing with attempts to make profits out of food supplies.

Mobilisation is beginning to-night and will be continued to-morrow in accordance with the decision to mobilise the 8th Infantry Brigade as a mobile reserve for the defence of the Sydney fortress and portion of the 16th Infantry Brigade for the defence of Newcestle. The 8th Infantry Brigade as commanded by Colonel Campbell and comprises the 25th, 29th, and 35rd Infantry drawn from the city, Woolloomooloo, Miller's Point, and western suburbs. The point of the present mobilisation as far as Sydney is concerned, is at Randwick, and the public are asked by the military authorities not to hamper the troops by througing round the site.

It has been persistently rumoured this afternoon that the Nord Deutscher Lloyd Company's mail stranger Scydlits, which hurriedly left Sydney Harbour on Monday has been oversien by the Australian dectroyer Parramata and is now being conveyed back to Sydney. Incluries, however, in official quarters, show that so for there is no foundation for the report.


Received your wire intimating war had been declared. Stop. Owing to our isolated position and dependence upon outside sources for large quantities of food supplies also consideration that principal industries carried on by assistance outside capital necessity for mining timber etcetera fact that one mine already closed down, and that difficulty may be experienced in near future in feeding large bodies unemployed men and their dependents as food supplies already increasing in price think it necessary to regulate same. Stop. To this end we are considering introduction following Bill. Begins: An Act to regulate the sale of the necessaries of life during war. Be it enacted. Clause one This Act may be cited as the control of trade in war time act. Clause two. In this Act the following terms have the meanings stated . Necessaries of life - such products goods chattels and things as the Governor may by proclamation declare to be necessaries of life for the purposes of this Act. Stop. Fersonal requirements: The requirements of any person for not exceeding three months for the domestic use of himself his family dependents and servants, and of his domestic animals. This Act shall have operation only during such Clause three. period as the Governor may from time to time by proclamation declare, when a state of war exists between the United Kingdom and some other Power. Clause four: The Governor on the advice of a Royal Commission



which the Gove or is hereby authorised to appoint may by order in Council fix the maximum prices that may be lawfully charged for the necessaries of life. Clause five. No person having in his possession, or power, any necessaries of life in excess of his personal requirements shall refuse to sell and deliver the same to any other person on demand, and on payment or tender of a price so fixed. Penalty one thousand pounds, or imprisonment for not exceeding twelve months. Clause six: On the conviction of any person under the last preceding section, it shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer and all persons acting with his authority to seize, take possession of, carry away, and dispose of any necessaries of life in the possession of power of the offender, and for such purpose to enter upon any premises in which such necessaries of life may be or be supposed to be and to use such force as may be necessary subject only to the payment of maximum prices so fixed as aforesaid. Cluse seven: No person shall buy up or store the necessaries of life with an attempt to raise the prices thereof, or to prevent free circulation thereof, or without the consent in writing of the Colonial Treasurer export the necessaries of life to any place beyond the limits of the Commonwealth. Penalty one thousand pounds or imprisonment for twelve months. Clause nine. Any Police Officer acting with the authority of the Commissioner or Inspector, or Sub-Inspector of the Police Force and, any other person acting with the authority of the Colonial Treasurer, may enter and mexxe search any premises upon which such Police Officer or person believes that any necessaries of life are kept, contrary to the provisions of this Act. Cluse ten: Whoever aids, abets, counsels or procures, or by act or omission is wax any way directly or indirectly concerned in the commission of any

offence against this Act shall be deemed to have committed such offence, and shall be punishable accordingly. Clause eleven: In every prosecution under this Act an averment of the prosecutor contained in the information or complaint shall be deemed to be proved in the absence of proof to the contrary. Clause twelve: No presecution under this Act shall be commenced without the authority in writing of the Attorney General first obtained. Stop. Ends. If within our powers consider it desirable following additional clause be inserted in Bill as clause eight: Begins. No person shall export gold from Western Australia to any place beyond the limits of the Commonwealth without the authority in writing of the Colonial Treasurer, penalty one thousand pounds, or imprisonment for twelve months. Ends. Which would necessitate adding to title of Bill the following. Begins: And to enable the exportation beyond the limits of the Commonwealth of gold to be prohibited. Ends. Stop. Government fully recognise your powers under certain conditions to supergede such an act. Please reply urgently.
